
1. Workshop 1 Recap

2. Fill Out the Online Survey

3. Participate in the Interactive Mapping

- Reflect on how these questions relate to potential park improvements.





4. Upload Photos + Comments in the Community Chat Section


Return to the interactive map:

Find the community chat icons on the map. Upload photos of areas in the park and add comments explaining:

- Why the area was chosen.
- What changes or improvements you envision.
- How those changes could benefit the community.





5. Review and Analyze Submitted Answers

Look at the answers submitted by other participants.

Spot similarities and identify common themes in the feedback.

Highlight key trends, such as frequently mentioned ideas or recurring themes (e.g., "more benches" or "better lighting").



6. Identify the Most Impactful Ideas

Instead of just rating answers, focus on the ideas that stand out:

What makes an idea impactful?

It addresses a big issue or meets a clear need.

It's creative and realistic to achieve.

It would positively affect many people.

Examples of impactful ideas:

- "Create shaded areas with seating for families."
- "Install recycling bins near picnic spots to keep the park clean."

Use these examples to inspire how you evaluate others' answers and your own contributions.



7. Download, Sketch, and Upload Your Observations

Mark areas of the park you think could use improvements or new features.

Sketch potential ideas or highlight opportunities.

Take a photo of your completed map and upload it to the Community Chat Section.




8. Review the History of the Park

Familiarize yourself with the context and past efforts to help shape your ideas for Workshop 2.

The history of a place is integral to replanning because it preserves cultural identity, fosters community trust, and informs better design decisions by learning from past successes and challenges. Recognizing historical context ensures social and environmental sustainability, often through adaptive reuse of existing structures, and helps address systemic issues like inequality in infrastructure or public amenities. Honoring legacies and stories associated with a place enriches its meaning and ensures new designs resonate with residents.
